

In Malawi, selection for secondary school education is something of an achievement. However, if you're an orphan, or the child of poor parents, you don't celebrate your success, because secondary schooling costs money. Many head teachers spend time in an often futile search for sponsorship for hard working and promising pupils, whose only chance of a future is a secondary education. AQUAID LIFELINE are presently sponsoring 239 young people at an average cost of just £50.00 per annum, which includes exam fees and uniform costs. In our photo, (on the right), our co-ordinator explains the work of AQUAID LIFELINE by showing a recent newsletter to eager benificiaries of our Orphan Scholarship Fund in Chikwawa District in the southern region of Malawi. This fund extends to 10 schools around Malawi, and we aim to expand it as funds allow.


LATEST NEWS FROM OUR ORPHAN VILLAGE AT NAMISU, RURAL BLANTYRE, MALAWI, CENTRAL AFRICA

IRRIGATION.....IRRIGATION.....IRRIGATION

Our village is now totally self sufficient in vegetable and egg production, due to our irrigation system.

Here's a field of cabbages watered by one of 5 canals which are fed by a 10,000 litre reservoir. Buildings in the background are, *Left to right:* Day Care Centre, Reservoir, Chimwemwe Orphan House, Chicken Barn and Mtendere Orphan House.

We are now able to sell surplus vegetables and eggs. We use the proceeds to buy chicken feed and vegetable seed etc., after we have fed the 300+ orphaned and needy children who are dependant on AQUAID LIFELINE for their daily needs





Mr Namwiri, our farm manager assisted by a staff member using syphons to create a rice paddy! Our water supply is 50 metres below ground, and is pumped up to the reservoir by solar power. AQUAID LIFELINE has pledged a gift of irrigation systems to 10 local farmers. The pilot scheme is due for completion in April 03. We are convinced this is the answer to the cycle of famine caused by drought.
